What is monitoring and evaluation?

Monitoring is like doing a check-up of your car – you need to make sure the tires and engine are good so you can keep driving. Monitoring helps the Northern Land Council (NLC) keep on track and heading towards goals set by Traditional Owners. Monitoring is also a way to recognise and celebrate achievements.

About the CP&D program

The NLC's Community Planning and Development (CP&D) Program started in 2016. It helps Aboriginal people to drive their

own development projects and secure benefits from their land, waters and seas. The NLC committed to establishing a comprehensive CP&D monitoring system in 2018 to strengthen the process and track progress of the program.

About the monitoring project

The NLC will conduct three monitoring experiments as part of the monitoring project. These experiments will help the CP&D Program and Traditional Owners work out the best way to measure the success and value of community development projects. The project runs for three years from 2019 to 2022.

The three monitoring experiments are summarised below:
